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Notes to the financial statements For the year ended 30 June 2023

1 Summary of significant accounting policies

The Navy Clearance Divers Trust was established by Trust Deed dated 23 September 2020.

The trustee has prepared the financial statements of the trust on the basis that the trust is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial reports. This financial report is therefore a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in order to meet the needs of the beneficiaries.

(a) Basis of preparation

The requirements of Australian Accounting Standards do not have mandatory applicability to the Trust because it is not a "reporting entity". However, the financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs.

(b) Revenue recognition

Donations are recognised as income when the amounts are received or deposited in the bank account.

(c) Fundraising functions

Income from fundraising functions is disclosed in the period in which the function is held. All costs of the function are similarly disclosed in the period the function held.

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Trustee's declaration

As stated in Note 1 to the financial statements, the trust is not a reporting entity because, in the trustee's opinion, it is unlikely that users exist who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy, specifically, all of their information needs.

This is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared for internal purposes.

In the trustee's opinion:

(a) the financial statements and notes set out on pages 1 to 4:

(i) comply with Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements to the extent described in Note 1; and

(ii) present fairly the trust's financial position as at 30 June 2023 and of its performance for the financial period ended on that date; and

(b) there are reasonable grounds to believe that the trust will be able to pay its debts as and when they become due and payable.
